The Children's Health Research Institute, The University of Western Ontario and Partners In Research are pleased to announce the 2009-2010 Elementary School Report Contest for grades 7 and 8 students in The Thames Valley District School Board, London District Catholic School Board, and regional private schools. The theme of the contest is *“The Scientific Journey: Pathways to Discovery.”*

Reports, typewritten and limited to 1000 words in length, will be accepted on any topic related to **“How Health Research Helps Kids”** (see [list of topics](#) below). All entries must be received no later than March 5, 2010 @ 4pm.

PRIZES: For students in the Thames Valley District School Board, London District Catholic School Board and regional private schools we will be awarding a series of cash prizes. These prizes will consist of Gold **(\$150)**, Silver **(\$100)**, and Bronze **(\$50)**. The grand prize winner in addition to receiving an award of **\$150** will be given the opportunity to be a “Scientist for a Day” (which involves spending a day visiting the research laboratories at the Children's Health Research Institute, and attending a luncheon with a research scientist). The roving Honour Board will also be displayed at the grand prize winner's school for the year.

All entries must be accompanied by a completed entry form indicating the student's contact information, the name, address and telephone number of their school, and appropriate contact person (e.g., science teacher, advisor and/or principal).

About the Report Contest Sponsors



Report Topics

The theme of the Report contest is '**How does health research help kids?** Tell us about a research breakthrough you have learned about, or a current research topic related to kids that you are interested in.

Suggested topics:

- Growth and development
- Cells, tissues, organs and systems
- Nutrition
- Effects of substance abuse on children
- Long term effects of children's health on the family and community
- Impact of technology on health research
- Other topics of your choice

Report submissions that comply with all official rules as set out will be judged by a panel of experts recruited by the Children's Health Research Institute. Papers will be judged by: (1) content, (2) originality, (3) organization and (4) grammar.

Official Rules for the Report Awards Program

- Each report must be accompanied by an entry form that includes the student's name, grade, name of school and name of contact person (e.g., science teacher, principal) and contact information (e.g., telephone/email address).
- All reports must be titled.
- Reports must contain a minimum of 300 words and no more than 1,000 words.
- Reports must be typed.
- All reports must be free of plagiarism and written in your own words.
- Each report should include a bibliography at the end of the report.
- Reports must be submitted electronically.
- Do not include identifier information (e.g., name, school name) on the report pages.
- All entries become the property of the Children's Health Research Institute/Partners In Research and will not be returned.
- Your entries must be received no later than March 5, 2010 @ 4pm.

Eligibility: Students in grades 7 and 8, currently enrolled in elementary schools from the Thames Valley District School Board, London District Catholic School Board and regional private schools may submit entries.
